Building and consolidating the statistical infrastructure

1960s to 1970s

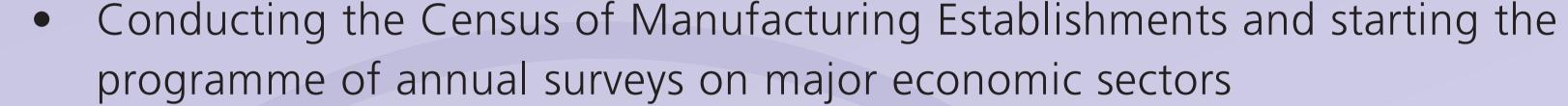
Setting up a central statistical office in Hong Kong

Establishing the Census and Statistics Department (C&SD) in 1967

Developing demographic and labour statistics systems

Conducting population censuses/by-censuses and series of labour force surveys

Building foundation for economic statistics



Compiling Gross Domestic Product (GDP) estimates, merchandise trade statistics and Consumer Price Index series

1980s to 1990s

Developing statistics to reflect Hong Kong's evolution from a manufacturing centre into an international trading hub

> Statistics on outward processing trade, rates of re-export margin, offshore trade and other trade-related services (including merchanting and merchandising)

Compiling statistics to help understand the structural transformation of Hong Kong into a service-based economy

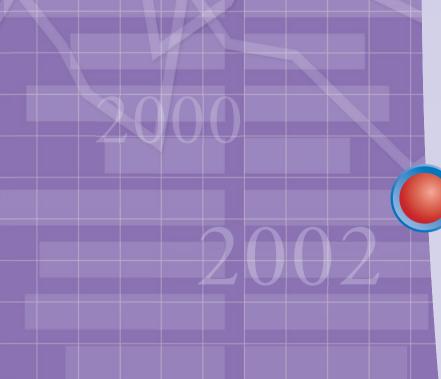
Annual GDP by economic activity and annual Gross National Product (GNP)

Producing indicators to gauge short-term changes in the economy

Monthly/quarterly statistics for major economic activities, quarterly GDP and quarterly GNP

Enhancing the statistical infrastructure for reflecting different social phenomena

Statistics on issues of topical interest and/or public concern (e.g. population and



labour mobility, health status, welfare benefits, crime victimisation)

The Millennium

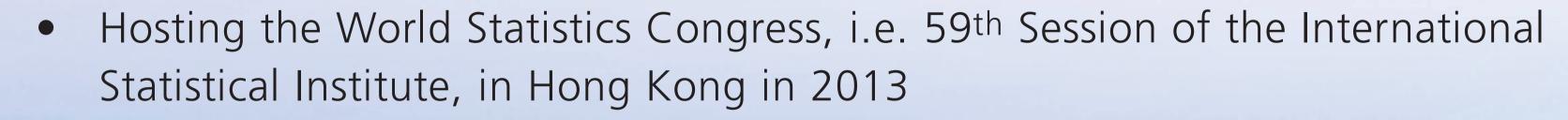
Developing statistics to track the burgeoning of Hong Kong into a premier international financial centre

- Statistics on Balance of Payments, international investment position and external debts
- Statistics on inward foreign affiliates trade in services and asset management
- Statistical indicators for understanding Hong Kong's development into a knowledge-based economy

Strengthening the role of statistics in the formulation of government policies/strategies

- Deploying anonymised passenger movement records for compiling population estimates to better reflect the mobility of the population
- Conducting detailed studies on income distribution in Hong Kong to support formulation of the relevant government policies/strategies
- Compiling detailed wage statistics to facilitate analyses relating to the Statutory Minimum Wage
