FOREWORD TO THIS VOLUME

This, the third and last volume of the 1961 Census Report, contains the tables on Economic Characteristics, *viz.*, those relating to employment generally, to employment other than agriculture and fishing, and to agriculture and fishing. The last-mentioned includes, for the first time in any Hong Kong census, a study of the tenure of agricultural land holdings.

The numbering of chapters, paragraphs and pages in this Volume follows on that of Volume II.

CHAPTER XXI

COMMENTS ON THE ECONOMIC TABLES

- 21.1 The **warning** in 7.3 of Volume I and 20.1 of Volume II applies with still more force to the economic tables. Some of the abbreviations used are meaningful only if read with the full description in mind, e.g. **SERVICES** as an industrial heading in Table 238 does not mean the armed forces but the whole of *Major Group 8* in **Code 5**, including entertainment, domestic service, hotels and restaurants. That is why the **Codes** were printed in Volume I to enable the reader, when using the tables in Volumes II and III, to have the appropriate **code** open before him at the same time.
- 21.2 **Tables 201 to 252** relate to **employment generally**.
- 21.2.1 It has already been remarked that the male labour force participation rate in Hong Kong is very high: 90.5% of males aged 15 and over, as compared with 85.0% in Japan. The whole labour force is 1,211,999 and these are analysed by sex, age group and location in **Tables 201-5**.
- 21.2.2 **Tables 206-9** analyse similarly the economically inactive population. For the full definition of economically active and inactive please see the footnotes to **Code 4** on page XXIX of Volume I.
- 21.2.3 **Table 210**, which analyses the labour force by sex and conjugal status, merits careful study. Note the 47,151 widows and divorcees, 32,481 of them aged 45 and over. Tai Po seems to have rather more than its natural share of these—see **Tables 211-4** which break the figures down into districts.
- 21.2.4 **Table 215** is perhaps the most important table in the whole Report. It divides the whole population aged 6 and over by employment status. Employees of all kinds total 998,666, students 659,206, housewives 472,949, self-employed 123,861 and employers 57,400. The small number of female employers will be a shock to the feminists.
- 21.2.4.1 A curiosity is the item of 2,043 **male house-wives**. These are men who stay at home and do the housework while their wives, mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, sons or daughters go out to work.
- 21.2.4.2 The 56,426 **persons of independent means** contain a large number who live by being principal tenants or sub-tenants, letting part of their accommodation to others. On a larger scale this would count as real estate business.
- 21.2.4.3 The heading "6-14 NOT AT SCHOOL" means neither at school nor working, see Volume I, **Appendix V, Code 4**, note (b).
- 21.2.5 **Tables 216-220** show the employment status groups by areas and districts, divided into ages 6-17 ("under 18") and 18 up. **Table 221** crosses employment status with conjugal status.
- 21.2.6 **Table 222** shows that there is no significant correlation between length of residence and employment status, and no economic difference between Hong Kong born and immigrant. It might have been thought that new arrivals would find it harder to get permanent monthly paid work, but no such tendency appears. 65% of all employees are permanent monthly paid.
- 21.2.7 **Table 223** isolates those among the labour force who are heads of households and compares them by the **tenure** of their accommodation. No trends are shown.
- 21.2.8 **Table 224** takes the whole labour force, divided into land and sea areas, and compares each employment status group by type of accommodation. Here there are several significant correlations.
- 21.2.8.1 Of the 313,373 who live in a whole house or self-contained flat, 206,585 are permanent monthly in-workers, 24,718 are self-employed and 22,412 are employers. But plenty of employers are nevertheless found in wooden huts, in bed-spaces and on roof-

tops. Insofar as economic success can be measured by employment status, it would appear that while the successful man prefers to live in a whole house or in a self-contained flat he is willing to accept sub-standard housing if need be. This willingness is perhaps the true measure of the housing famine,

- 21.2.8.2 The table for the sea areas shows the large proportion of unpaid family helpers among the fisherfolk—22,211 out of 38,999 in the table. Probably a good proportion of the 11,841 housewives of the boat population, or at least of the five or six thousand who are fishermen's housewives, should be added to this score.
- 21.2.9 It is only to be expected that there is a strong positive correlation between standard of education and ability to secure the best jobs which may be taken to fall within the three groups, *employers*, *own-account* and *permanent monthly* in-workers. **Table 225** gives details for every category of the labour force. **Appendix XXVII** shows the same condensed, with percentages.
- 21.2.9.1 The category of *private tutor*, meaning those who have received an education but not at school, is represented mainly among the higher age groups, since young people seldom now receive this type of education. This probably accounts for the high percentage of self-employed—proprietors of one-man concerns—in this group.
- 21.2.9.2 The unemployment percentage is practically the same throughout the field, the *mean* percentage including job-seekers being 1.72% from which no category differs by more than 0.47%. However, those with university, post-secondary or higher secondary education have a much better chance of being employers or permanent monthly-paid employees and if these two columns in Appendix XXVII are taken together the gradation is very regular.
- 21.2.9.3 It is nevertheless true that in this Colony where nothing succeeds like success, there are nearly 100,000 bosses or permanent monthly-paid employees who had no schooling whatever.
- 21.2.10 **Tables 226-228** show the whole working population, divided broadly by sex and age, in their specific occupations defined according to the sub-groups in **Code 8**. The reader may be seriously misled if he uses this table without constant reference to that code in **Appendix V** of Volume I.
- 21.2.10.1 This classification is based on the *International Standard Classification of Occupations*⁽¹⁾. It has been adapted to Hong Kong conditions, but where the same term is used it bears the same meaning. Therefore any reader wishing to ascertain in which sub-group an occupation has been classified, where the occupation is not specifically mentioned in Appendix V, may find it in the I.L.O. publication quoted in the footnote. A guide to the occupational classifications, with much fuller definitions than those given in the training manual, but not so full as those in the I.L.O. book, was duplicated and supplied to every chief enumerator for reference. It included all the occupations regarding which difficulty was expected, but as was bound to happen did not provide the answer to every query.
- 21.2.10.2 The occupation of *buttoner-up* was not previously known to the census staff and appears to fall somewhere between the category of *industrial inspector* and *garment maker (other)*. The work is connected with the sewing on of buttons to otherwise completed knitted garments. The buttons are usually sewn on by out-workers, and after collection are inspected for the soundness of the sewing and if found suitable are buttoned up. For lack of previous definition these persons had generally been included under *tailors, etc.*
- 21.2.10.3 Other occupations which gave the enumerators difficulty included *herbalists* (correct classification: *other food and beverage workers*, not *physicians*), *mah-jong school fookis* (correct classification: *recreation workers n.e.c.*, not *teachers*; and *fortune-tellers* (correct classification: *service workers n.e.c.*, not *members of religious orders* unless they really are monks).
- 21.2.10.4 In two categories in Table 226 (and probably the same two categories in Table 227) the figures in the table are obviously incorrect. The occupation *administrative officers* was defined in the manual as follows:—
 Administrative officers, government, including heads and assistant heads of technical departments (*specify*).
 The word *specify* meant that the actual post was to be stated. The total number of officers in the service of the Hong Kong Government to whom this description applies cannot on any score exceed 100, but the description was claimed by 755 males and 65 females, a total of 820, and accepted by the enumerators, who probably did not know what *administrative* meant. Since there exists in Hong Kong an uncertain number of persons in the employment of foreign governments who could fairly claim the description of an administrative officer it is impossible to rectify the score in this line of the table.

- 21.2.10.5 Much the same applies to the description of *executive officer*. This was defined in the manual as :—
 Executive officers, government, including chief clerks and section heads, and railway station masters (*specify*).
- The total number of posts classified as executive officers in the 1961 Staff List was 200 and on the 1st April, 1961, there were nine vacancies. Even if station masters and analogous categories are counted in, the total cannot much exceed 300, plus perhaps a score or so in the employment of foreign governments. Yet 1,386 men and 175 women classified themselves thus, which meant that more than 1,000 should probably be transferred down to the category **workers in other clerical occupations**.
- 21.2.10.6 At the time when the original census plan was prepared it was foreseen that the detailed occupational classification would give rise to some inaccuracies. With the exception of the instances I have given, the reader should be able to determine for himself which are the categories most prone to mis-description and should bear in mind, when using the table, the well-attested human tendency to self-promotion. Countries which maintain a classification of deceased persons by occupation have been long aware that those recently deceased are, on the average, assigned a higher socio-economic status than those still alive. For exactly the same reason, an enumerator calling at a household in the absence of its bread-winner would, on the average, obtain a slightly more flattering description of his occupation than he would have received from the bread-winner himself, which may in its turn not precisely coincide with the description which might be obtained from the bread-winner's employer.
- 21.2.11 The remarks in the preceding paragraph regarding the accuracy of the occupational sub-groups do not apply, save to a minor extent, to the classification of major groups, since the difficulties of definition resulting from self-promotion did not normally take an individual from one major group to another. The only exception is the group which in these tables is summarized by the code word **managerial**.
- 21.2.11.1 **Table 229** shows the working population by occupation in major groups divided into sex and conjugal status.
- 21.2.11.2 **Tables 230, 231 and 232** analyse the same population according to their length of residence, the tenure of the accommodation in which they reside and the type of accommodation.
- 21.2.12 The reader may observe in Tables 215-225 (employment status) the comparatively large number of people classified as **own account**, that is to say self-employed. Such a category covers a wide range of economic activity, from independent professional men to hawkers. The detailed classification is shown by **Table 233**.
- 21.2.12.1 Surprise may be felt at the 898 persons described as *auctioneers, etc.* The full description in **Code 8** is:—
 Insurance and real estate salesmen, salesmen of security and services, auctioneers and advertising agents (*specify*).
- A comparison with **Table 237** below will leave no doubt of the explanation. There exists in Hong Kong a description of free-lance commercial agents, described as **general brokers**. These were given a separate sub-group in **Code 5** and would more appropriately be classified in **Table 233** one line lower, under *Commercial travellers and manufacturers agents*.
- 21.2.13 **Tables 234 and 235** will repay careful study by those interested in the pay packet side of the labour force. In this census **no question was asked on the amount of earnings** either of an individual or of a household. The **method of remuneration** however (monthly, daily, etc.) was asked of all employees.
- 21.2.13.1 The period used was that by which the salary or wages was reckoned, **not** the frequency of payment. Thus pay received monthly but calculated by the day is **daily**.
- 21.2.13.2 See **Appendix V, Code 4**, notes (f) and (h) for the meaning of *monthly* and *daily* rates.
- 21.2.13.3 That a far greater percentage of female than male workers are on piece rates is obvious from **Table 234**. This topic is further developed in **Appendix XXVIII** which shows the degree of correlation between sex, occupation and status in the working labour force.
- 21.2.13.4 **Table 234** can also be used to obtain a quick appreciation of the division of the labour force between the occupational groups, but this may be found more conveniently from **Table 235** which shows also the percentages, leaving out employers and self-employed.
- 21.2.13.5 Both these tables are most usefully compared with **Tables 243 and 244**, for which see 21.2.19, below.

- 21.2.13.6 Including employers and self-employed, occupational **major group 7/8** (*craftsmen, labourers and production workers*) accounts for 47% of the work force; without them for 51½%. **Group 9** (*service, sport, etc.*) with employers and self-employed has 16½%, without them 18%. **Group 4** (*sales workers*) with employers and self-employed 14½%, without them 9½%. The great difference in Group 4 is caused by the large number of small enterprises (one man business and small employers) in retail trade, including hawking.
- 21.2.13.7 Table 235 also carries a stage further the inquiry in Table 222 (see 21.2.6, *above*). Although Hong Kong birth is not positively correlated with the more favoured types of employment status, there is a strong positive correlation between Hong Kong birth and professional and managerial work, and an appreciable correlation with office and sales work. Those who were not born in Hong Kong but lived here before September 1949 have nearly equal chances of any kind of work, with insignificant preference for office and sales work. While those who have come here since September 1949 are negatively correlated for all but production and labouring.
- 21.2.14 Before passing from Tables 234 and 235 a word of explanation is required about the reconciliation of their totals with those of Tables 243 and 244. Occupational Code 8C (see Volume I, **Appendix V**, page XXXIV) listed farmers and fishermen as *inapplicable*, since farmers were separately classified under **Code 8A** for *land tenure* and *chief secondary crop* and fishermen under **8B** for *main and alternate method* of fishing. In industrial **Code 5** however, farmers and fishermen were assigned to **major group 9** and farmers were classified under **eleven sub-groups** by their *principal crop*. But the number by which the total in Table 243 exceeds that in Table 234 does not equal the total number of farmers and fishermen. The reason for this is that 105 men and 1 woman, though working on farms (and therefore classified under the farming **industry** were engaged in special trades, occupations or professions not described as farming and therefore classified in the **occupational** code by the personal description of the work of each.
- 21.2.15 The relationship of educational attainment to occupation is plainly discernible from **Table 236** which should be used in conjunction with Tables **225** (see 21.2.9, *above*), **252** and **Appendix XXVII**.
- 21.2.16 **Tables 237 to 244** examine the industrial classification in the same way as the occupations were examined in Tables 226 to 236. The reader should remind himself of the difference between these two classifications. In the relevant United Nations document⁽¹⁾ they are defined as **occupation**: the kind of work done by the person employed **industry**: the kind of establishment in which the person works.
- 21.2.16.1 The industry tables are arranged in three ways: (a) by major group, (b) by sub-group, (c) by **abridged sub-group**. For the major groups and sub-groups please see **Appendix V, Code 5** in Volume I, and footnotes below Table 237. The **abridged sub-groups** are very easy to follow and in **Appendix XXIX** the totals from important Table 237 are shown in this abridged form for ease of reference.
- 21.2.16.2 The picture is many-sided. The biggest single group is textile manufacturing with 195,702, but non-textile manufacturers employ 301,292 people, too.
- 21.2.17 Among the industrial *sub-groups* the biggest single employer of women is still personal service (18.78%) followed by garment making (13.15%). The biggest employer of men is retail and wholesale trade (8.45%) with garment making second (5.92%). When the sexes are combined garment making leads (7.99%).
- 21.2.18 The pattern of industry in the New Territories is well brought out by **Table 242**. Agriculture (with a little fishing) is still the largest employer of labour in the census areas of *Sai Kung, Tai Po* and *Yuen Long* (in that order) and in all the census districts of the *Islands* except *Cheung Chau*, which has a pattern of economy all its own, and *Tai O—South Lantau* which are affected, at least presently, by the large reservoir works in progress.
- 21.2.19 **Table 243** is the companion table to **234** (see 21.2.13, *above*) and the degree of correlation between sex, industry and status in the working labour force is shown by **Appendix XXX**. Similarly **Table 244** is the companion table to **245**.
- 21.2.20 **Tables 245 to 252** were included in the programme because it was not realized how few unemployed there were. The total number being only 12,311 males and 3,491 females is really too small to justify detailed study, but the tables having been made are presented without further comment than to say that the percentage of unemployed varies very little between the age groups; and that the attempt to study the unemployed by *last industry* failed because 43% of them would not say, or could not remember, what their last jobs had been.
- 21.2.20.1 As already remarked in 21.2.6, ability to find work seems to be unaffected by length of residence; neither, as remarked in 21.2.9.2, is it affected by education.
- 21.2.20.2 It is regretted that two misprints occurred in Table 249 and were not detected until too late to correct them. The mis-spelling of TEXTILE will mislead nobody, but the fifth category from the bottom should be STORAGE AND COMMUNICATIONS and not "Storage, communications and community services".

- 21.3 **Tables 301 to 311** relate to employment other than agriculture, forestry, hunting and fishing. They were prepared separately because the further details required after Table 252 were not required for the farmers and fishermen, who in turn required several tabulations of their own.
- 21.3.1 **Table 301**, a voluminous table running to six sheets, divides the non-farm working population by sex and place of residence, using the same *urban/suburban/rural* definitions as in **Table 010** (see 20.4.3 in Volume II). The principal value of this table will be for the planners of separate districts; but a fact of general interest is the great shortage shown of doctors who reside (and thus are available for night calls) in the rural parts of the New Territories.
- 21.3.2 **Table 302** should be used in conjunction with **Tables 216** (21.2.5, *above*) and **226** (21.2.10, *above*). **Tables 303-305** narrow the enquiry down to census districts. They contain no surprises.
- 21.3.3 **Table 306** is the first and only table which crosses industry with occupation. See 21.2.16, *above*.
- 21.3.4 **Tables 307-311** carry further the enquiry commenced in Table 249. As already stated in 20.2.20, *above*, much of the value of these is lost by the failure to record the last job of 43% of the unemployed. Still the district tables show that while only the Peak is entirely without unemployment, no particular district and no particular trade showed any significant number of unemployed. The same goes for the classification by sex, age and last occupation in **Table 311**.
- 21.4 **Tables 401-413** and **423-425** cover a detailed examination of the farming population by age, sex, educational attainment, literacy, land tenure, size of household, description of farming and place of birth or origin. Originally programmed for the last task of the machine room (as dealing with a minority, though a socially important one) their **production was expedited**, at the request of the Director of Agriculture and Forestry, by duplicating a complete set of the farmers' cards which were then kindly tabulated by the Department of Commerce and Industry on their own machines, using the paper *Interpretation of Punch Cards* (19.2.2, *above*). Access to certain of the census records was also made available to a small number of members of the staff of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry who, having previously been seconded to the Census Department for duty in the New Territories, were already bound by the census officers' oath of secrecy. This was then to have laid the foundation for a **special survey** of a sample of New Territories villages. Unfortunately staff difficulties have interrupted this work in the Department of Agriculture and Forestry with the result that not even preliminary results are available for quotation. It is to be hoped that the study will be completed while it may still be of use.
- 21.4.1 The age groups used in these tables were special, being designed to throw light on the employment in farm occupations of juvenile and adolescent labour; of which as it turned out, little exists.
- 21.4.1.1 **Table 401** shows that under 1% of farm workers are under 14 and only 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ % 14 and under 18. Up to and including 19 there are more girls than boys, then males begin to predominate which indicates *either* that many farmers' daughters abandon farming on marriage *or* that many farmers' wives preferred to describe themselves as housewives.
- 21.4.1.2 Comparison with Table 201 shows that the average age of farmers is considerably higher than among the economically active in general. The *median* age of the labour force is 24 (males 25, females 24); the *median* age of the farmers is 40 (males 41, females 38), this phenomenon may indicate in part a drift of young people **from the land**, such as occurs in many rural communities; and in part a movement **back to the land** by those too old for factory employment. Since there is no sign of depopulation of farming areas, and 15.6% of the farming population (compared with 7.9% of the labour force generally, and 7.6% of the population at large) is aged 55 and up, the second explanation probably accounts for more than the first: but a third consideration is that farmers seldom wish, or can afford, to retire.
- 21.4.2 **Tables 402** and **403** effectively evaluate the problem of uneducated and illiterate farmers. The problem is acute for females but fairly in hand for males. There are only three blind farmers, of whom one can read Braille.
- 21.4.2.1 A study was made, using a purposive sample of schedules, of the education and literacy position by sex and age in five of the most remote rural areas of the New Territories, compared with control areas of similar size in the town. Processing of the results is complete, but the report being of a special nature will appear separately, if at all.
- 21.4.2.2 See also 21.4.9, *below*.
- 21.4.3 **Table 404** shows, rather surprisingly, that farm households do not significantly differ in size from other households in this Colony. There is, however, a difference in the size of household as between different types of farmer: rice growers have families slightly larger, and vegetable growers, pig and poultry raisers noticeably smaller households than the colony average. See also 21.4.7 and 21.4.8, *below*.
- 21.4.4 The question of land tenure is examined in **Tables 406 to 408**. The land tenure code (**Code 8A** in Appendix V, Volume I, page *XXXIII*) applied only to *master farmers*, of whom there were 26,088, and not to *hired hands* and other assistants who totalled 21,047. See also 21.4.7, *below*.

- 21.4.4.1 **Appendices XXXI and XXXII**, both condensed in different ways from **Tables 407/8** show that there are several important correlations. In these appendices the tenure classes are grouped by the type of holding (Appendix XXXI) and by the type of rent (Appendix XXXII). No enquiry was made, of course, into the **amount** of rent, nor were any land holdings measured. The unit, one *master farmer*, is equivalent to one holding or group of holdings. Such holdings are small by world standards, in well-irrigated land seldom exceeding **one acre** which is regarded as fully sufficient to support a family of five or six persons.
- 21.4.4.2 In both these appendices the areas and districts are also **grouped into two**:—those in which *Hakka* farmers predominate and those in which *Punti* farmers predominate; sub-totals are shown for each group. Both tables agree in indicating the *Hakka* averseness from renting land.
- 21.4.4.3 The proportion of farmers farming land which is **their own** personal or ancestral property, including those few who own some land and rent additional land, is **54.57%** made up of 66.07% in the *Hakka* areas and 44.18% in the *Punti* areas. The census district with the **lowest proportion of owner farmers** is Fanling (in the *Punti* part of Tai Po census area) where out of 2,041 master farmers only 387 farm their own or ancestral land and 87 farm some land of their own and some rented, a total of **23.22%**. It is a pity that this extremely **untypical** area should have been the scene of the only scientific study so far, to my knowledge, published about Hong Kong farmers.
- 21.4.4.4 **Appendices XXXIII and XXXIV** show the land tenure and type of rent analysed by principal crop. They serve to quantify the fact, already observed, that rice and pig farmers were typically landowners, vegetable and poultry farmers typically tenants. The gradation is: rice 72.55%, pigs 61.11%, other 55.24%, poultry 41.64%, vegetables 40.10%. The percentage of landowners among the vegetable growers is rather higher than expected.
- 21.4.4.5 Leases of agricultural land were divided into **long**, i.e. 15 years or more, and **short**. The reason is that by local custom the lessee of a long lease has certain rights to safeguard his tenure which do not go with short leases.
- 21.4.4.6 There are several kinds of **ancestral land**. Some is let to a member of the clan for a term of years, or in perpetuity, with the obligation to maintain the clan meeting-hall or school. Some is let to him for a small rental, which again goes to maintain the hall or school. Some is given rent free for his lifetime to a clansman fallen on hard times, for his upkeep: he is the owner in all save the right of disposal. Other land again is owned in common by several members of the same clan, who farm it in rotation. The code effects some simplification.
- 21.4.5 The category **vegetables** was widely defined. It included barley, kaoliang, sorghum, millet, tapioca and all cereals but rice; sweet potatoes and peanuts; such fruits as cucumber, melon, tomato, brinjal, okra, squash and gourd, besides the leaf vegetables. But it did not include **tea**, which was classified as a forest product.
- 21.4.6 The category **cattle** included horses, sheep and goats. But rabbits were included under **poultry** with hens, ducks, geese, swans, pigeons and quails.
- 21.4.7 Rent is expressed in a lease of agricultural land (whether oral or written) as so much rice, so much silver, or a combination of the two. Table 407 shows among other things that money-rent tenants have significantly smaller families than owners or grain-rent tenants. This is no doubt associated with the family size of vegetable growers, who prefer to pay cash rents. The explanation of both may be that vegetable growers are not able to continue to the same advanced age as rice growers. There was no tabulation of description of farming by age groups.
- 21.4.8 **Tables 409 and 410** analyse the 28,610 farmers who were heads of household by employment status, size of household and *tenure of the house occupied*, as distinct from the land farmed. It is clear from this table that the great bulk of farmers (**83.11%**) are neither employers nor employed, but farm the land by themselves, with the help of their family. And **86.11%** own the houses they live in.
- 21.4.9 **Tables 411 to 413** show further details of the literacy and educational standard of farmers. See also 21.4.2, *above*. Table 403 has already shown that the bulk of the illiteracy is among the females (**80.13%**). Table 411 focusses attention down to the self-employed and unpaid family workers. In fact the survey previously mentioned indicates that nearly every farming woman aged 50 and above is illiterate and has never been to school; from 35 to 49 there are plenty of literate women, but not one-half; while below 35 the female literacy rate is not greatly below the male. An interesting gradation of literacy between farming types is shown by Table 413; the percentages of literate farmers are poultry 76.06%, others 64.26%, vegetables 60.65%, pigs 54.88%, rice 48.09%. Contrast the figures for land ownership in 21.4.4.4, *above*.
- 21.4.10 **Table 423** is of concern mainly to specialists. The general reader will find interest only in the column headed "Grand total", which shows the farmers of each category with their secondary crop. Where the secondary crop is the same as the first it means that the farmer grows only that crop.

21.4.11 **Tables 424** and **425** were undertaken at the special request of the Director of Agriculture and Forestry, and show that the indigenous farmer prefers to grow rice while the immigrant prefers vegetables, with an eye also on poultry and pigs. All but a handful of the farmers hail from Kwangtung Province: those from **other provinces** total 1,019 out of 47,223, or **2.16%**.

21.5 At the same time as the farmers' cards were duplicated and passed out for priority treatment, the fishermen's cards were similarly duplicated and processed by the Stores Department, which at that moment had a little spare machine time. This kind co-operation of the Controller of Stores was keenly appreciated, and enabled a set of **Tables 414** to **422** and **Table 426** to be supplied on 4th December, 1961, to the Commissioner for Co-operative Development and Fisheries in time for examination before he went on home leave. Unfortunately, by an omission that did not come to light until after the Census Department had been disbanded, the cards for the 1,290 fisherfolk living on shore (see 21.5.2.3, *below*) were not duplicated and so are omitted from these tabulations. The total by sex and district is given in **Appendix XXXV**.

21.5.1 The **age groups** used for the fishermen are the same as for the farmers: see 21.4.1, *above*.

21.5.2 The reader is reminded of the distinction between the three terms "boat people", "fishing people" and "fisherfolk".

21.5.2.1 The **boat people** are all the people who dwell afloat on small craft; on Census Day 1961 these numbered 135,956. See Volume II, 14.6.1.

21.5.2.2 The **fishing people** mean all those who dwell on fishing boats; on Census Day 1961 these numbered 81,649. See Volume II, 20.4.4.

21.5.2.3 The **fisherfolk** (preferred to *fishermen* because 14,243 of them are female) are those whose actual occupation is in the fishing industry. These do not all belong to the boat people, and they were therefore enumerated in two stages: 25,265 males and 13,973 females at the Marine Census, February 11th to 14th, 1,020 males and 270 females at the Land Census, February 25th to March 7th.

21.5.3 The **fisherfolk** are further sub-divided; certain tables referring only to those who are **heads of household** (11,479) and others to those who are **masters** (11,186).

21.5.4 **Table 414** lists all fisherfolk living afloat (including 11 males described as *unemployed fishermen*) by sex and age groups in marine districts.

21.5.4.1 The **special age groups** used in the fishery tables are the same as those for the farmers: see 21.4.1, *above*. The *median* age for fisherfolk is between that for farmers and the rest of the labour force (see 21.4.1.2 *above*): males 31, females 28, both sexes 30. There are 3,937 children under 14 and 4,352 young persons aged 14 but under 18.

21.5.5 **Table 415** lists the fisherfolk aged 14 and up by sex and degree of literacy. Only 2.85 of the females can read. The problem of illiteracy among the boat people generally, not merely the fishing people, is a challenge that will demand great ingenuity and skill to meet it. The boat people have a traditional aversion to letting any member of the family, except at the point of death, pass the night ashore. With goodwill and trust this aversion may gradually disappear; but even so it is a painful sacrifice both for the parents to leave their children ashore for schooling, and for the children to be separated from their parents. The demographer is fortunately required merely to state the problem as it appears from the census records, not to postulate its solution.

21.5.6 **Table 416** analyses the fishing households by their sizes and the **description of fishing**, in marine districts. As mentioned in Volume II, 12.2.6, the code for the description of fishing, both main and alternate, was entirely recast after the Pilot Marine Census. See Volume I, **Appendix V**, page *XXXIII*, **Code 8B**. The code used in the pilot census was based on the type of boat used; that used in the main census on the tackle. Admirable sketches of every kind of fishing boat, net and tackle were made by the Fisheries Department's artist, reproduced on the **magic box** (see Volume I, 5.4) and after being explained at special instruction classes were distributed to every marine enumerator.

21.5.6.1 It must be remembered that the Census was taken in the early spring when the boats had just returned from their last fishing trip before lunar New Year. The description of fishing, based on the tackle actually visible, would therefore be that from which the boat was returning. For the alternate method of fishing, *i.e.* the chief method used at other seasons, please see Table 426 and 21.5.11, *below*. It may be that over a twelve-month period of inquiry the method described in Table 426 as *alternate* might appear as the *main* form and *vice versa*.

21.5.6.2 The *household* was in nearly every case coterminous with the *boat*. The size of household is correlated with the means of fishing, the purse-seiners having the largest and the hand-liners the smallest.

21.5.7 **Table 417** is a good example of well-meant instructions going astray. The method of fishing used by a fishing household living on a boat was obviously the same for the whole boat. The **enumerators** were therefore told in paragraph 5.3.14.3.4 of the Marine Census Training Manual to ask this question of the head of household only, and the answer would then apply to every *economically active* member of his household. But no instruction reached the **card markers** (see Volume II, 18.1) for this information to be marked on the cards for other members than the head. The age breakdown of Table 417 is therefore of little value, since it includes only heads of household.

- 21.5.8 **Table 418** shows that the great majority of fishing households are headed by fishermen who are self-employed (79.07%) or employers (13.64%). The remainder, all but a handful, are permanent employees on monthly rates (5.47%). Table 422 shows that over half the fisherfolk are **unpaid family workers**, who are naturally not shown in the tables restricted to heads of household.
- 21.5.9 **Table 419** presents basically the same information as **416** (21.5.6, *above*) but not in districts, and with the addition of employment status.
- 21.5.10 **Tables 420 to 422** throw further light on the dark picture of fisherfolk's education and literacy, see 21.5.5, *above*. There is however a modest ray of hope. Leaving aside those under 14, for whom an active programme of education is in progress (see Colony Annual Report, *Hong Kong 1961*, page 106) **Appendix XXXVI** shows that the position among the *under thirties* is appreciably better than among those 30 and up, and that if a basic literacy programme can be made to reach some 6,000 of the fisherfolk aged 14 to 29 inclusive, whether by radio or by classes which they can attend while their boat is in port, a 50% literacy level might be soon reached.
- 21.5.11 **Table 426**, added to the programme at the special request of the Commissioner for Co-operative Development and Fisheries, shows the 11,186 master fisherfolk by **main and secondary methods of fishing**. Where the same method appears both as main and secondary it means that *no secondary method* was stated. This was so in 6,205 cases, or 55.47%. The percentages of secondary methods **where stated** are shown below:—

CHAPTER XXII

THANKS AND APOLOGIES

- 22.1 The **thanks** of the Census Commissioner are due:—
- 22.1.1 To the Vice-Chancellor of Hong Kong University, to the Director of Education and to the supervisors and principals of innumerable private schools for lecture rooms, offices, staff, time and advice.
- 22.1.2 To the Director of Agriculture and Forestry, the Commissioner for Co-operative Development and Fisheries, the Director of Education, and the Director of Marine, for allowing staff to be seconded for duty as Census District Supervisors.
- 22.1.3 To the Director of Marine, the Director of Urban Services and the Government Printer for prompt aid in the emergencies described in Volume II, 14.3, 13.3.2 and 15.4.1 respectively.

CHAPTER XXIII

ADVICE TO THE READER

- 23.1 It is not expected that many people, except **census administrators** themselves, will read all three volumes of this report from cover to cover. Those who do will find some assistance in the Table of Contents to each volume, the Index to the Tables which follows the Appendices in each volume, and the **alphabetic index** to all three volumes which follows the Tables in Volume III.
- 23.2 Specialists in search of particular information would do better to start with Appendix V in Volume I, and then to the alphabetical index.
- 23.3 The **general reader** will find some interest in Chapters I and II of Volume I, Chapters VIII, XI and XX of Volume II and Chapter XXI of Volume III. He will be well advised to skip the methodological details. But if he examines the tables he must not forget to keep an eye on Appendix V in Volume I while he does so.

CHAPTER XXIV

FURTHER DEMOGRAPHIC STUDIES

- 24.1 No **population projections** are included in this Report. A small unit under Mr. Benjamin N. H. Mok, B.A. was formed within the Department of Commerce and Industry on 1st May, 1962, following the **closure of the Census Department**, to take in hand the work of graduating the age tables, computing age and sex specific survival rates and from them, by standard methods of retrojection and projection, arriving at figures for the mid-year population of each year from 1956 to 1966. The work is expected to take about six months.
- 24.2 As mentioned in 21.4.2.1, *above*, a study of education and literacy in five **remote rural areas** is in preparation.
- 24.3 Information has been supplied to the University of Hong Kong, Department of Geography to enable them to compile detailed population and **linguistic maps**.
- 24.4 Sketches have been made for future studies on **ages reckoned by the lunar calendar**, and on some features of the **economic structure** disclosed by this census.
- 24.5 It is hoped to produce, a few weeks after this Report, a sixteen-page illustrated summary in English and Chinese for popular use entitled **THE CENSUS AND YOU**.
